

# FACT SHEET 2024

Our 2+ acre campus in the heart of the Taos historic district contains the home, studios, and gardens of E. I. Couse and J. H. Sharp, two of the founders of the Taos Society of Artists. It is also home to The Lunder Research Center, a 5,000-square-foot museum facility that includes exhibition space, collections and archive storage, a research library, and curatorial and office space.

#### WHAT WE DO

We believe in the transformative power of art and education to inspire, enrich lives, and connect people. Together we can tell a more complete, nuanced, and holistic story of the USA and our shared identity as Americans.

CSHS does not charge admission or sell ordinary museum memberships. Exhibitions, tours, and most events are free.


- We do not believe money should be a barrier to education and personal growth.

#### **COLLECTIONS & ARCHIVES**

- About 1,400 objects in permanent collections, including significant holdings of Spanish Colonial artworks and furnishings and of Indigenous artworks
- 193 paintings and works on paper by E. I. Couse, plus 36 sketchbooks
- 65 works of art by Taos Society of Artists members Kenneth Adams, O. E. Berninghaus, Ernest Blumenschein, Catharine Critcher, E. Martin Hennings, Bert Geer Phillips, Julius Rolshoven, Joseph Henry Sharp, Walter Ufer
- 51 prints, I oil painting, and 54 drawings by Gene Kloss
- Library: more than 3,500 titles
- Archives: approximately 900 linear feet
- Digital assets: 22,556 items

#### 2024 PROGRAMS

- Tours: In-depth, small-group interpretive tours by appointment with trained volunteer docents and staff
- Events: Roundtables, lectures, and panels (4); La Luz de Taos gala and art sale; public open house tours (2); nonprofit organization group tours (20); Southwest Art History Conference reception; public December holiday celebration; 4 exhibition openings
- Exhibitions: Through the Lens of Taos Day School (youth photography), La Luz de Taos (contemporary, nationwide), On Which It Rests (contemporary abstract, local), Julius Rolshoven: A Cosmopolitan in Taos (historic), Vecinos y Amigos: Bert Geer Phillips and his Neighbors (historic). Mirroring our research and collecting focus, we mix contemporary and historic shows, many highlighting the underrepresented artists of Taos and the Indigenous and Hispano communities of the region.

• 12-member Board of Directors; 55 members of Advisory Councils and Board Committees; approximately 40 other active volunteers; 8 permanent staff, plus seasonal museum fellows and interns

- FY 2025-26: ~\$1.1 million
- FY 2026-27: Forecast ~\$1.3 million

- Current promised gifts: approximately \$1 million (not yet producing revenue)
